Foundations of Inclusive Governance at Scottish Autism




2011 Public Service Improvement Framework identifies 'User Participation' as an organisational priority for Scottish Autism.

Various practice initiatives underway by 2013 including Service Forums, more inclusive review processes.

Practice Research projects set out to capture and share innovations in involvement and inclusive practice.

2015 Scottish Autism signed "Charter for Involvement".





Context (early 2010s)

- Greater emphasis on 'user participation' in health and social care services, growing talk of co-production.
- A growing autistic self-advocacy movement leading critical engagement with practice models and research. Emphasis on neurodiversity paradigm, social models of disability, human rights.
- Critical questions appearing in research context intersect with practice and service provision.




The Voice and Participation project

- Use of technology for choice-making and recording





The Voice and Participation project



"Recognising, validating and acting upon an individual's unique way of communicating is to recognise their 'voice' whether that is in the literal sense – through spoken communication – or through non-verbal means"

"Participation and Involvement mean supported individuals taking a role in making decisions about their lives and the support that they receive"



Key themes

Individual Involvement

- Preserving authenticity of voice
- Harnessing interests and media meaningful to the person
- Ownership of process
- Providing a concrete output
- Family involvement and shared understanding

Collective involvement

- Recognising and validating individual voice
- Structuring space and format
- Turn-taking and active listening
- Autonomy and responsibility

Understanding communication enables us to listen to an individual person's voice and choice.










The individualised survey workspace
